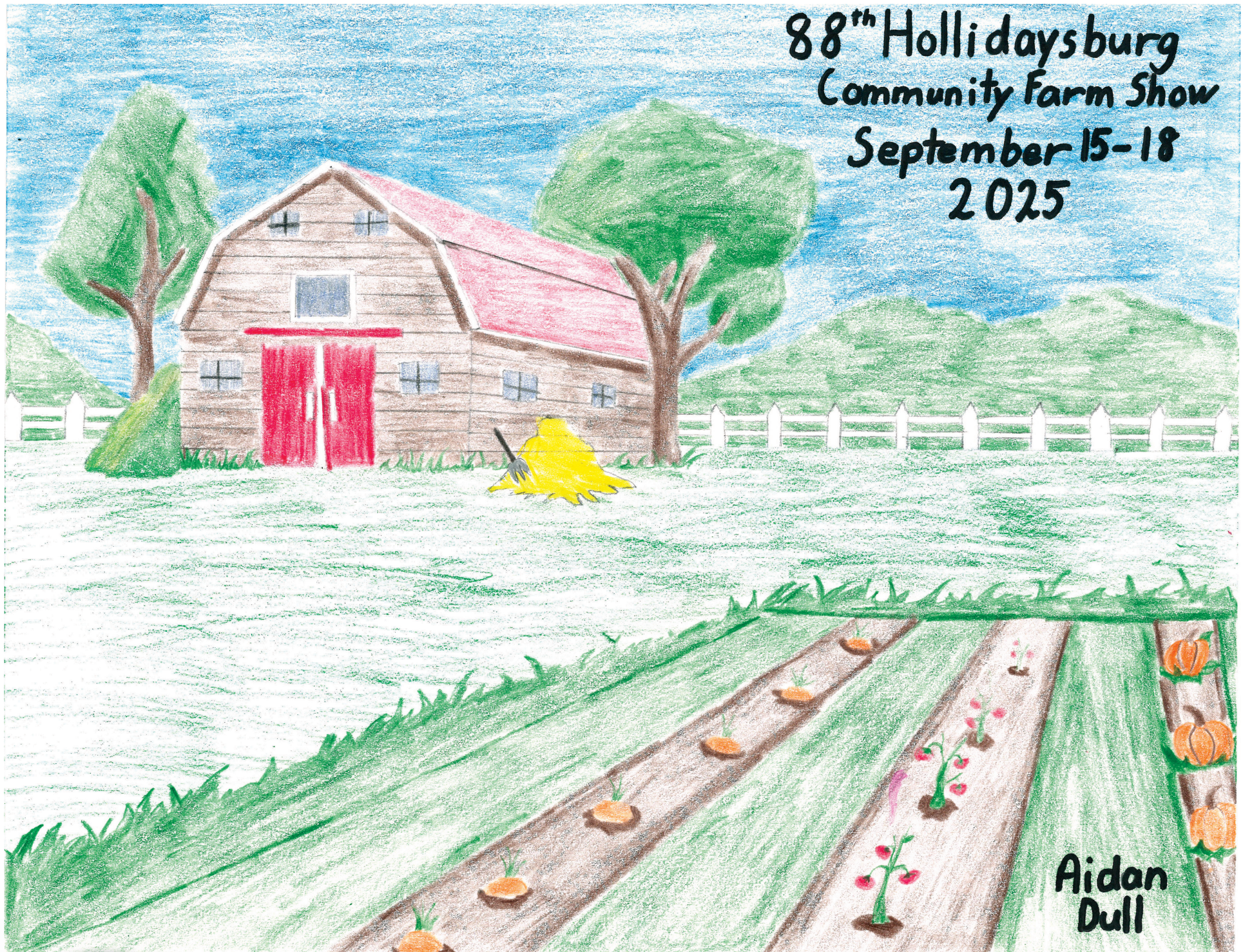





PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING TO ASSURE COMPLIANCE.

A change in the booklet has been completed this year. This process will continue until the Booklet appears to be at its best. Please note the changes made this year are to eliminate some problems of past years in completing the entry forms.

Adult Tag: Complete fully the Department, Class, and Sub-class of your entry at the top and the entry number and your name at the bottom on the white tag.

Youth Tag: Complete fully the Department, Section, Class, and Sub-class of your entry at the top and the entry number and your name at the bottom on the yellow tag.

The booklet continues to list the youth and adult together. Hopefully at this point the booklet has become more user friendly.

Please read the booklet carefully when completing the entry tags.

Some entries remain the same as previous years while others have been dropped or added. The use of colored entry tags remains the same. **(Yellow tag for Youth / White tag for Adult / Orange tag for Contests)**

Youth is considered to be anyone under 19 years and a High School student.

Be sure the right tag is used. Yellow for Youth. White for Adults. Orange for Contests.

This Premium List has been assembled hopefully without any errors. In this as in other things errors may be found. If so please notify one of the Officers for correction in future publications. Further if any suggestions are available likewise please notify one of the Officers.

Note: The use of an orange tag will be for contest entries. See committee members for instructions.

POLICY STATEMENT

1. All entries listed in this catalog will be exhibited in the Hollidaysburg Senior High Sports Building. (Next to the Baseball Field.)
2. All entries are free.
3. Each entrant must secure entry card for each exhibit.
4. The management reserves the right to accept or refuse any and all entries. Entrants will secure an exhibitor's number and then will be instructed how to make entries.
5. Articles which have previously won premiums at this show will not be accepted for competition again, (Articles **must** be made by Entrant.)
6. Entries may be entered on Monday, September 15, 2025, from 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. and on Tuesday, September 16, 2025, from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. (All entries must be made by Tuesday, September 16, 2025 at 10:00 a.m.)
7. Judging starts at 12:30 p.m. on September 16, 2025, at that time we will be closed for judging.
8. Entries shall be the product of the exhibitor.
9. Antiques and Novelties may be exhibited but will not be judged in competition nor prizes awarded.
10. An entrant is discouraged to enter more than one entry in each class or sub-class. Only one prize can be awarded.
11. If an exhibit is improperly entered, the judges may re-enter it and judge it in the proper class.
12. No award shall be made in any case unless the exhibit is worthy. In case of no competition the judges may award a lower prize than 1st place at his or her discretion.
13. The record of the secretary shall be the final evidence for awards.
14. 1st, 2nd, and 3rd prizes will be awarded for all classes and sub-classes except as noted.
15. All exhibits will be entered in open competition.
16. The Show Committee will afford all possible protection for exhibits but will not be responsible for losses.
17. **Exhibits may NOT be removed until Thursday Evening**, September 18, 2025, at 7:00 p.m. or Friday Morning September 19, 2025, 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. All things not picked up on Friday, September 19, 2025 become the property of Farm Show.
18. Exhibits will be released at the close of the show by presentation of stubs or by other means of identification satisfactory to the Committee.
19. All receipts of the show must go into the Farm Show Fund unless otherwise designated by the directors.
20. All premiums will be paid by check. The checks must be presented for payment within ninety (90) days from the date thereon.
21. All booth exhibits should be of uniform size - 3 feet deep and 3 feet wide.
22. All Entries competing for prizes may have nothing added to the exhibit that would identify the entrant.
23. Exhibits accepted only for items listed in book.
24. It is expected the premiums will be paid on the last night of the Show. Due to the shortage of time, and the size of the job, the following rules shall apply:
 - The right to delay payment to a later date is reserved.
 - The Secretary's record shall be final for all disputed premiums
25. **TAGS SUPPLIED BY HOLLIDAYSBURG WILL BE HONORED ONLY.**

Some rules cover more than one Department.

DEPARTMENT 8	Poultry (Eggs)	Rule A — Page 5
1. Specimens are to be clean and free of any blemishes.		
2. Entry must be own production.

1. All entries are to be made by the student.

1. Quality and Size-Medium sized specimens are generally best.

DEPARTMENT 15	Home Products	Rule E — Page 5

BAKED GOODS:

1. Exhibits must be made and owned by exhibitor.
2. Do not use Commercial Mix.
3. Breads are to be Fork marked.
4. Display in baggies.
5. Due to the concern that any entry may spoil borders on being wasteful and very costly to the entrant, each entry **may** become the property of the Hollidaysburg Community Farm Show. All items must be placed in/on disposable containers. After judging is completed a sample will be held for display **and if approved by the entrant the remaining portion will be sold** during the bake sale or it will be available to the entrant for their own use. A Tag will be available to note your choice. The Farm Show will not be responsible for containers that are not disposable.
6. The Bake Goods Sale will begin after Judging on Tuesday of the show week.

CANNED OR DRIED PRODUCTS:

1. Exhibits must be prepared by entrant.
2. Canned foods to be judged on quality, general appearance, and container.
3. Use standard mason-type, clear quart/pint only glass jars for preserving and exhibiting fruits, vegetables and meats. Do not remove rings on jars; use new rings.
4. Use two-piece self-sealing lids (flat discs and metal screw bands) for sealing all jars of food.
5. All food not in standard jars or not sealed with self-sealing lids will be disqualified by the Judge.
6. Container will be opened on jams, jellies, preserves, marmalade & pickles.

JELLIES, PRESERVES AND BUTTERS

- 1. Exhibits must be prepared by entrant.
- 2. Canned foods to be judged on quality, general appearance, and container.
- 3. Use standard mason-type, clear 1/2 pint or pint jars for preserving and exhibiting jellies, preserves, and butters.
- 4. Use two-piece self-sealing lids (flat discs and metal screw bands) for sealing all jars of food.
- 5. All food not in standard jars or not sealed with self-sealing lids will be disqualified by the judge.
- 6. Containers may be opened.

DEPARTMENT 17 Floral Rule F — Page 6

- 1. All exhibits for competition must have been grown by the entrant except those used in the arrangement classes. All arrangements must be arranged by the entrant.
- 2. Entrants must furnish own containers. Use containers that won’t tip over. **No paper cups.**
- 3. House plants must have been the property of the entrant at least three months prior to the time of entry and grown in the pots in which they are entered.
- 4. No entry may be entered in more than one class. Entrants may enter as many classes including sub-classes as they desire. Duplicate entries not accepted.
- 5. Any entry not meeting the requirements will be disqualified.
- 6. By definition
 - A bloom is an individual flower (1 bloom on a stem)
 - A stem is a portion of a plant with a number of flowers (more than 1 bloom on a stem)
 - A spike is a thick stem carrying many florets

HOUSE PLANTS

- 1. Only one species per pot except in collection classes.
- 2. **Pots are not to exceed 10 inches in diameter or 10 inches in width.** (The pot must pass through a 10 inch circle if round or a 10 inch square if not round)

SPECIMEN FLOWERS

- 1. Entries must be cut flowers grown by the exhibitor and must conform to the number of blooms, stems, or spikes specified in each class.
- 2. The uniformity of height, color, or size is an important factor in evaluating entries.
- 3. Flowers in each entry must be of one color and variety unless otherwise stated.
- 4. No paper cups.

ARTISTIC ARRANGEMENTS

- 1. Fresh or Dried flowers are acceptable in all entries except Class 80

DEPARTMENT 18 Needlecraft Rule G — Page 6

- 1. An entry is to consist of one garment.
- 2. Each entry will be judged on material, design suitability, and workmanship.
- 3. All articles of clothing must have been made by the exhibitor since the close of last year’s farm show. **No repeat entries accepted.**
- 4. **Items must not be soiled.**

NEEDLEWORK

- 1. All needlework articles must have been made by the entrant within the last year except rugs, quilts, and bedspreads.
- 2. Exhibits are to be shown one time. No repeats from previous year(s).

DEPARTMENT 19 Arts, Crafts, and Photography Rule H — Page 6

- 1. Paintings are not to exceed 20 inches by 20 inches including frame.
- 2. All entries must be the work of the exhibitor.
- 3. All entries are to be 4” x 6” minimum or 11” x 14” maximum **mounted on mat board.**
- 4. Limit one entry per Sub-Class.
- 5. Glass in frames will be accepted but the Farm Show will not be responsible if broken.

DEPARTMENT 20 Group Exhibits Rule I — Page 6

- 1. Booths will be box shaped, 4 feet wide and 4 feet deep.
- 2. Exhibit is to be of a project nature and not a general exhibit of farm or home products. It should be educational and developed around one central thought.
- 3. Entries will be competitive and judged under the following:
 - Timeliness
 - Originality
 - Ability to tell story quickly
 - Eye appeal
 - Attention getting
- 4. Exhibits must be in place no later than Tuesday morning of farm show week.
- 5. Use orange tags for entries.

The goal of the PA Preferred® Baking Contest is to encourage young people across the Commonwealth to participate in Pennsylvania's agricultural fairs by showcasing Pennsylvania grown and produced products in their contest entries.

RULES:

1. Open to any individual **amateur** baker (ages 8 through 18 at the time of the fair's contest) who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
2. Entrants may **NOT** have won 1st place in this PA Preferred® Junior Baking contest at any other fair in 2025.
3. Entry must be **six (6) individual sized portions** of the baked entry item (cookies, brownies or bars).
4. The Cookies, Brownies or Bars, and any fillings and frostings, **must be made from scratch with edible ingredients**. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (*ex: no pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.*). Any decorations must just be edible.
5. At least two (2) PA Preferred® or locally produced ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients include grains (*such as oats or flour*), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
6. **A PA Preferred® logo is not required** because not all PA Preferred® products carry the label. The name of the ingredient and the source is sufficient (*see attached example*). Contact RA-AGPAPreferred@pa.gov for any assistance with qualifying ingredients.
7. Entry must be submitted for judging **on a food safe disposable setting**. (*All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.*)
8. The PA Preferred® entry and its recipes will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.
9. Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8-1/2" x 11" sheets of paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. **The name of each PA Preferred® ingredient or locally produced ingredient must be clearly listed along with the name of the source that made/grew the product** (*ex: PA Preferred Milk – Galliker's brand or Apples - Smith Farm Orchard*). Entrant's name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages.
10. Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.

EVENT - Each county/local fair is encouraged to conduct a 37th Annual Blue Ribbon Apple Pie Contest at their 2025 event. Listed below are the criteria which we would like each fair to use in their contest. The certified first place winner from each fair will then have the opportunity to enter an apple pie in the BLUE RIBBON APPLE PIE CONTEST at the 2026 PENNSYLVANIA FARM SHOW.

RULES for local Fair and the PA Farm Show contests are as follows:

1. Open to any individual **amateur** baker who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
2. Entrants may **NOT** have won 1st place in this Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest at any other fair in 2025.
3. The Apple Pie, including fillings and crust, must be **made from scratch with edible ingredients**. No prepackaged ingredients may be used (*ex: no pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.*) Any decorations must just be edible.
4. Recipe **must include at least 60% apples in the filling**. It does not need to be a "traditional" two crusted apple pie and it can have a variety of fillings.
5. The entire pie must be submitted for judging in a food safe disposable pie pan. (*All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.*)
6. The Pie entry and its recipes will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will **not** be returned.
7. The recipe for the pie and pie crust must be submitted with the entry. It should be submitted on one side of 8 1/2" by 11" sheets of paper. The recipe must list all the ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. Entrant's name, address and phone number must be printed on the **back side** of all the pages.
8. Refrigeration is **not** available at the Fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.
9. Judging will be based on the following criteria:

Flavor.....	30 points
Filling (consistency, doneness, moistness & flavor)	25 points
Crust (color, flavor, texture doneness)	20 points
Overall Appearance (surface, shape, size, color)	15 points
Creativity	5 points
TOTAL	100 Points

Creativity is essential to a varied competition. Do not limit your contest to a "traditional" two-crust apple pie. We are looking for a variety of fillings in the pies; the pie must include at least 60% apples in the filling.

Each Fair must submit the Contest Summary Report verifying the winning apple pie baker. This person will then be eligible to enter the state competition at the 2026 PA Farm Show and will receive the Official PA Farm Show Certification Entry Form directly from the PA Fairs Special Baking Contest Committee.

NOTE: *If an individual has already won 1st place at another fair in 2025 for this Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest, that individual is now considered qualified through that Fair to compete at the 2026 PA Farm Show and is no longer eligible to enter this contest at any upcoming Fairs.*

FROM N. JUNIATA STREET
